The mission of Community Boards is to empower the communities and individuals of San Francisco with the strength, skills, and resources needed to express and resolve conflicts peacefully and appropriately for their culture and environment. We created the first and longest-running neighborhood mediation program in the United States. Our mediation panel model has been adapted nationally and internationally.

Community Boards believes mediation is about the disputants taking responsibility for their conflict and finding a solution that works for them. Our mediation services are available citywide at little to no cost in English, Spanish, Mandarin, and Cantonese. We maintain an active pool of 300+ volunteer Community Mediators.

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SAN FRANCISCO PEACEMAKER AWARDS

Community Boards introduced its San Francisco Peacemaker Awards in commemoration of our thirty-fifth anniversary in 2011. With the longest-running neighborhood mediation program in the U.S., our programming, services and trainings remain a national and international model of best practices. Not only does Community Boards continue to provide the public with high quality conflict resolution services, we foster and empower our volunteer Community Mediators, giving them critical personal and professional skills.

CELEBRATING OUR COMMON GROUND

Keynote Address

Today's partisanship has led to contentious political, cultural and social gridlock -- locally and nationally. Now, more than ever, people are seeking ways to restore public

civility and dialogue. In her keynote address 'Celebrating Our Common Ground,' Joan Blades, founder of Moveon.org, will share her inspirational vision and workable solutions for breaking this cultural gridlock and for building a healthier democracy.

Morning Workshop

In this interactive discussion and workshop Joan Blades will discuss her new project, Living Room Conversations. At their core, Living Room Conversations are about empowering citizens and revitalizing the art of conversation among people with diverse views. These intimate conversations can foster transpartisan dialogues, which in turn become rich opportunities to restore our relationships, focus our common goals, and make communities safer. They can transform polarized political norms into connections with shared aspirations and actions and can help us find common ground for collaborative problem solving based upon respect and connection.

This dynamic project provides a model that enables people to come together through their social networks to engage in a selfguided conversation about any issue to build respect and engagement.

Participants will learn about the model and receive guidelines for structuring and customizing their own conversations. Participants will hear about topics that work well for this format and how people have adapted the model to meet their own community's needs. Living Room Conversations have been used to talk about issues such as energy, crony capitalism, the role of government, immigration, money in politics, and gay marriage.

2012 San Francisco Peacemaker Award Recipients

The Raymond Shonholtz Visionary Peacemaker Award

John Cathey and David Sands are two Mission district neighborhood police officers who have pioneered a unique approach to help teens

leave gangs. While walking their 24th Street beat, they routinely saw teens stuck in a cycle of gang violence and jail time. Realizing that these teens needed an alternative, Officers Cathey and Sands began connecting them with full-time employment to help them launch promising careers and walk away from the gangs on which they depended. They also started a program to strengthen families of at risk youth and disrupt common gang recruitment tactics

that prayed on youth who felt like they lacked a family. Family and Education Over Everything provides support to families who believe in keeping strong values and family structure while promoting education as the road to success.

Officer Cathey shares, "Jail is a college for criminals. David and I know there are those who need to be locked up to protect others. However, not every gangster falls into this category. We were looking for a meaningful way to triage people who just need guidance and structure in their lives." As word hit the streets from those succeeding in the program, the work of these two officers has become more popular and many gang members have come forward to

request assistance leaving their gangs and finding employment. Community Boards is thrilled to celebrate their innovative and successful approach to transforming conflict and young lives. They are making San Francisco a more peaceful city.

The Gail Sadalla Rising Peacemaker Award

Dominic Sanchez is bringing conflict resolution skills to hundreds of young people throughout his school community with students who attend from all over San Francisco. As a student at Galileo High School, he is a leader of the Restorative Practices Program and developed a workshop to help his peers open up a dialogue between students of different cultures and ethnicities. Called CRASH, the workshop asks, "What really happens when we get up close and personal and talk about race?" Dominic also helped develop a program called Queertastic that has reached nearly 500 young men with messages about reducing risky sexual practices and appreciating diversity in sexualities.

In addition, Dominic is a student representative on the Peer Resources Youth Council and meets every week with other youth representatives to help guide their adult allies to better work with young people. Jackie Alarcon, one of Dominic's teachers shared, "Dominic is a trained conflict manager who has an extraordinarily calm spirit that helps him when he is reaching out to help other students solve their issues in a non-violent way. He is very passionate about making

this world a better place then he entered it. Dominic is a rare individual that helps keep me inspired and reminds me of why I became a teacher and went into the field of education." With this award, Community Boards recognizes Dominic for taking a stand against violence and working to build supportive, respectful youth communities.

Community Boards Leadership Peacemaker Award

The Mosaic Project is a nonprofit organization that works toward a peaceful future by uniting children of diverse backgrounds, providing them with essential community building skills, and empowering them to become peacemakers. Their unique outdoor school creates microcosms of the just, diverse, inclusive world we envision. This dynamic 4-night program for fourth and fifth graders brings together three classes from schools that differ markedly in socioeconomic, racial, and ethnic make-



up. By participating in the program together, students have the opportunity to experience firsthand a diverse setting in which all are

welcomed and respected. Together in a beautiful setting, they begin to recognize their commonalities and gain respect and appreciate for the uniqueness of all individuals, including themselves.

In addition, their Youth Leadership Project offer leadership training for high school and college aged students who serve as mentors for the fourth and fifth graders at their outdoor school. There, they can put theory into practice and demonstrate inclusivity and respect for their younger peers. The Mosaic Project's complementary work with adults helps inspire peace in wider communities through schools, community-based organizations, and the workplace. Their focus on empathy, appreciation of differences, assertiveness, team building, and conflict resolution creates more engaged, inclusive, and cohesive adult communities. For demonstrating that a more peaceful world is possible—and for inspiring young people to work to create that world—Community Boards honors The Mosaic Project with this year's Leadership Award.

Community Boards In Action

Neighborhood Mediation Program

Now in its 37th year, our flagship program continues to offer all SF residents with a viable, effective and affordable option for resolving their personal, domestic, school, workplace, and residential conflicts.

Conflict Coaching

With this new service, people can receive direct, one-to-one conflict resolution support and coaching with our trained conflict coaches.

Divorce Mediation

Beginning July 1, we will provide comprehensive mediation services for divorcing couples.

Taking Mediation to the People

Moving into its second year, this program provides a range of conflict resolution services to nonprofit social service agencies.

Neighborhood Courts Adjudicator Training

In partnership with the District Attorney's Office, Community Boards trains all volunteer adjudicators to serve as Court panelists with an emphasis in restorative practices.

In 2012-13, Community Boards...

- Received 1081 requests for assistance with disputes
- Opened 461 cases for mediation in English, Spanish, and Cantonese or Mandarin
- Mediated 93 disputes
- Waived 22% of case opening fees to keep our program services accessible to indigent and low income residents
- Received ongoing dispute referrals from SF Police Department (30%), 311 Customer Service Center (15%) and SF Planning Department (3%), among others
- Awarded 16 full and partial scholarships to our ADR trainings and workshops
- Hosted 21 interns with academic backgrounds in conflict resolution, social work, communications, international studies, and pre-law
- Added 32 new members into our membership program
